



A Horse, A Cow, Chickens, and Turkeys, Oh My!

"At this place we had a horse and a cow, a few chickens and turkeys. My wife would take care of the chickens and milk the cow and it was my job to look after the horse." In An Immigrant in 1887, John W. Nordstrom, co-founder of the Nordstrom department store chain, tells his story of emigrating from Sweden to New York in 1887, and finally settling in Seattle where he once owned property in Rainier Valley. John Nordstrom was 16 years old when he left Sweden. He arrived in New York with only five dollars in his pocket and not a word of English to his name. He made his way across the country and eventually to the West Coast, laboring in mines and logging camps and doing odd jobs. In "the summer of 1896 I went again to Seattle, as I liked it there. My work there was in a Fremont sawmill at a dollar and a half a day." In 1897, while living in

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Arlington, Washington, he saw the headline in a Sunday morning Seattle Post-Intelligencer that gold had been found in the Klondike of Alaska. The next day, in Seattle, he bought a ticket to Alaska. In The Seattle Daily Times, August 8, 1897: "Willamette Goes to Dyea [Alaska] Tomorrow with Eight Hundred Passengers and Two Hundred Head of Horses." J.W. Nordstrom was listed as a passenger. Two years later, with \$13,000 from his share of a claim, Nordstrom returned to Seattle."I was certainly happy to be back and at my sister's house. I had my first bath in over two years."

Nordstrom invested his money in real estate. He bought a lot on Bellevue Avenue between Pike and Pine Streets (\$800) and had two 7-room houses built there (\$2,500). On October 3, 1899, he bought a 10-acre tract of land in Rainier Valley on Juneau Street just west of Renton Avenue South. The sellers were Birdsey and Sarah Ella Wetmore. Purchase price: \$1,300.

That same year, Nordstrom renewed his acquaintance with a "girl I had taken out a few times before going to Alaska. The next spring this girl, Hilda Carlson, and I were married. This was in May 1900." After a honeymoon in Sweden, they returned to Seattle and lived in one of the houses on Bellevue Avenue. Later that year, Nordstrom

began to improve the land in Rainier Valley but realized, after working on it a few months, he couldn't make a living from the land and started looking for a small business to get into. He had met Carl Wallin, a shoemaker by trade, in Alaska and on Mr. Wallin's return to Seattle he had set up a shoe repair shop on Fourth Avenue and Pike Street. Nordstrom often visited Mr. Wallin in his shop -- one day Wallin suggested that they join in partnership and open a shoe store.

In 1904, when the shoe store business was three years old, Nordstrom had a house built on his property in Rainier Valley, at 3516 Juneau Street. The Nordstrom family moved to "the country" with their three children who were born by that time.

Later that year, according to The Seattle Daily Times, December 11, 1916: Nordstrom exchanged "two acres with residence in Rainier Valley at Juneau Street and Empire

Way, owned by J.W. Nordstrom, for a residence at 2811 Montlake Boulevard, owned by A. Laney," and the family moved north. Everett Nordstrom, the eldest of the three sons, had attended Franklin High School and entered the University of Washington in 1919, at the age of 16. He also attended Whitworth.

In 1929, after many years of working together in many locations in downtown Seattle, Mr. Wallin wanted to sell out, which turned out for the best. Mr. Nordstrom then sold the business to his three sons, in 1930. And the rest, they say, is history. With a little Rainier Valley history in the mix... John Nordstrom died in 1963 at the age of 92.
